Payment performance improves for the fourth consecutive quarter in Q2 2024

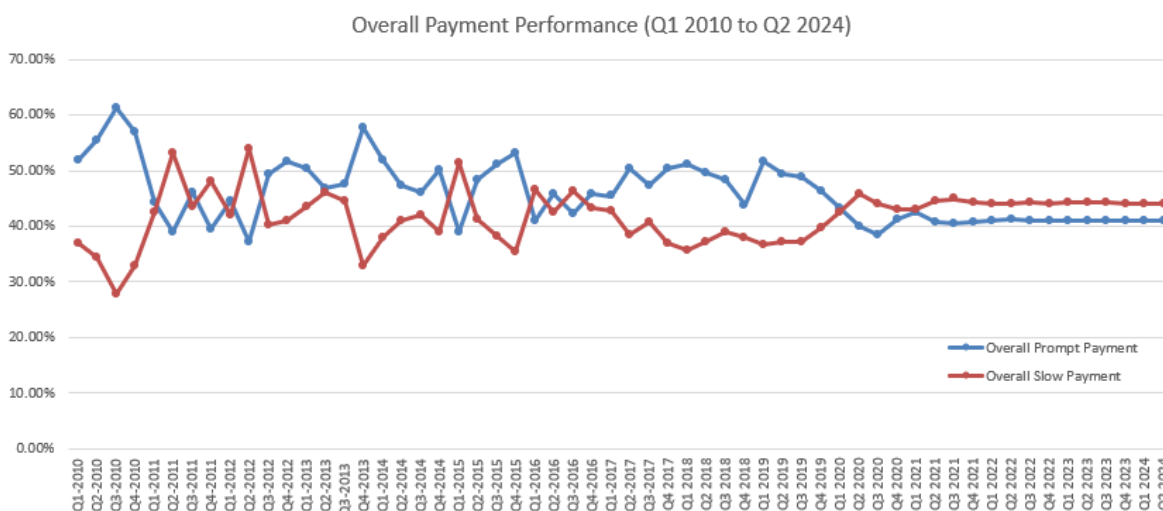
Retail, Services and Wholesale sectors saw improvements in q-o-q slow payments - Singapore Commercial Credit Bureau

Singapore, 02 July 2024 – Local payment performance improved for the fourth consecutive quarter in Q2 2024. According to Singapore Commercial Credit Bureau - a subsidiary under Credit Bureau Asia (CBA) Limited, a credit and risk information solutions provider in Southeast Asia, both prompt and slow payments accounted for slightly more than two-fifths of total payment transactions.

On a quarter-on-quarter (q-o-q) basis, prompt payments improved marginally, up by 0.04 percentage points from 41.07 per cent in Q1 2024 to 41.11 per cent in Q2 2024. Year-on-year (y-o-y), prompt payments rose by 0.19 percentage points from 40.92 per cent in Q2 2023 to 41.11 per cent in Q2 2024.

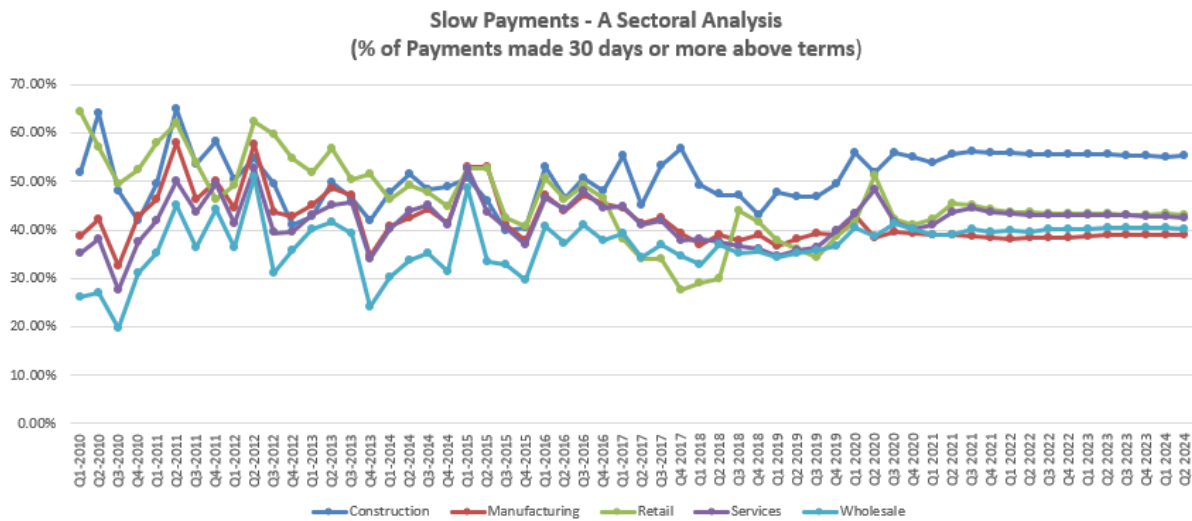
Slow payments fell further by 0.05 percentage points from 44.12 per cent in Q1 2024 to 44.07 per cent in Q2 2024. Y-o-y, slow payments slid by 0.25 percentage points from 44.32 per cent in Q2 2023 to 44.07 per cent in Q2 2024.

Meanwhile, partial payments inched up by 0.01 percentage points from 14.81 per cent in Q1 2024 to 14.82 per cent in Q2 2024. Y-o-y partial payments climbed by 0.06 percentage points from 14.76 per cent in Q2 2023 to 14.82 per cent in Q2 2024.



From a sectoral perspective, q-o-q slow payments have fallen in 3 of five industries in Q2 2024. On a y-o-y basis, 4 of five industries have also experienced improvements in slow payments.

Construction

Slow payments within the construction sector have rebounded after falling for three consecutive quarters in Q2 2024.

- ❖ Q-o-q slow payments rose by 0.04 percentage points from 55.20 per cent in Q1 2024 to 55.24 per cent in Q2 2024.
- ❖ The heavy construction sector saw the largest increase in payment delays, up by 0.07 percentage points from 54.65 per cent in Q1 2024 to 54.72 per cent in Q2 2024. Slow payments by the building construction sector rose by 0.03 percentage points, up by 55.72 per cent in Q1 2024 to 55.75 per cent in Q2 2024. Special trade contractors registered an increase in payment delays, up by 0.03 percentage points from 55.22 per cent in Q1 2024 to 55.25 per cent in Q2 2024.
- ❖ On a y-o-y basis, slow payments decreased by 0.46 percentage points from 55.70 per cent in Q2 2023 to 55.24 per cent in Q2 2024.

Manufacturing

Slow payments among manufacturers have risen after two consecutive quarters of decrease in Q2 2024 due to a fall in payment delays by general manufacturers, manufacturers of electronics and chemicals.

- ❖ Slow payments increased by 0.08 percentage points from 39.0 per cent in Q1 2024 to 39.08 per cent in Q2 2024.
- ❖ General manufacturers saw the largest increase in payment delays, up by 2.50 percentage points, from 42.35 per cent in Q1 2024 to 44.85 per cent in Q2 2024. This is followed by manufacturers of electronics, up by 0.93 percentage points from 45.15 per cent in Q1 2024 to 46.08 per cent in Q2 2024. Manufacturers of chemical products saw the third largest increase, up by 0.20 percentage points from 45.90 per cent in Q1 2024 to 46.10 per cent in Q2 2024.
- ❖ On a y-o-y basis, slow payments rose by 0.10 percentage points from 38.98 per cent in Q2 2023 to 39.08 per cent in Q2 2024.

Retail

Payment delays in the retail sector have decreased in Q2 2024. This is largely due to a decrease in slow payments by retailers of general merchandise, food and beverages as well as furniture and home furnishings.

- ❖ Slow payments fell by 0.11 percentage points from 43.26 per cent in Q1 2024 to 43.15 per cent in Q2 2024.
- ❖ Slow payments by retailers of general merchandise fell by 2.10 percentage points, down from 30.05 per cent in Q1 2024 to 27.95 per cent in Q2 2024. This is followed by retailers of food and beverages, down by 1.83 percentage points from 44.78 per cent in Q1 2024 to 42.95 per cent in Q2 2024. Retailers of home and furnishings saw the third largest decrease in slow payments, down by 1.17 percentage points from 40.95 per cent in Q1 2024 to 39.78 per cent in Q2 2024.
- ❖ On a y-o-y basis, slow payments fell by 0.20 percentage points from 43.35 per cent in Q2 2023 to 43.15 per cent in Q2 2024.

Services

Slow payments within the services sector continued to improve for the fourth consecutive quarter in Q1 2024 due to a decrease in payment delays by hotels and accommodation, health and consumer services.

- ❖ Q-o-q slow payments dropped by 0.17 percentage points from 42.75 per cent in Q1 2024 to 42.58 per cent in Q2 2024.
- ❖ Payment delays by consumer services saw the largest decrease, down by 2.09 percentage points from 45.47 per cent in Q4 2023 to 43.38 per cent in Q1 2024. This is followed by health services, down by 1.82 percentage points from 33.92 per cent in Q1 2024 to 32.10 per cent in Q2 2024. The hotels and accommodation sub-sector saw the third largest decrease in slow payments, down by 1.70 percentage points, from 41.85 per cent in Q1 2024 to 40.15 per cent in Q2 2024.
- ❖ On a y-o-y basis, slow payments fell visibly by 0.55 percentage points from 43.13 per cent in Q2 2023 to 42.58 per cent in Q2 2024.

Wholesale Trade

Payment delays within the wholesale trade improved moderately in Q2 2024 due to a decrease in both slow payments by wholesalers of both durable and non-durable goods.

- ❖ Q-o-q payment delays fell by 0.12 percentage points from 40.40 per cent in Q1 2024 to 40.28 per cent in Q2 2024.
- ❖ Slow payments by wholesalers of durable goods fell by 0.10 percentage points, down from 40.20 per cent in Q1 2024 to 40.10 per cent in Q2 2024. Payment delays by wholesalers of non-durable goods dropped by 0.15 percentage points, down from 40.60 per cent in Q1 2024 to 40.45 per cent in Q2 2024.
- ❖ On a y-o-y basis, slow payments dropped by 0.14 percentage points from 40.42 per cent in Q2 2023 to 40.28 per cent in Q2 2024.

“We are seeing a sustained uptrend in the overall payment performance of local firms for Q2 2024. The improvements in the retail, services and wholesale trade sectors have outweighed the slight decline in the construction and manufacturing sectors. Partial payments have also been on an uptrend for the past six consecutive quarters. This is a sign of greater credit vigilance among firms in the recent months.” commented Ms. Audrey Chia, SCCB’s Chief Executive Officer.

Commentary

Singapore Commercial Credit Bureau (SCCB) compiles the figures by monitoring more than 2.4 million payment transactions of firms. Payment data is contributed to the Bureau by local firms. Prompt payment refers to when 90% or more of total bills are paid within the agreed payment terms. Slow payment refers to when less than 50% of total bills are paid within the agreed terms. Partial payment refers to when between 50% and 90% of total bills are paid within the agreed payment terms.
